Historicizing Men and Masculinities in the Modern Middle East

Masculinity studies are one aspect of gender studies that only recently raised the awareness of scholars of Middle Eastern history. The history of women in the Middle East, their lives, identities and participation in historical process received much attention, but much less was devoted to the men's identities as gendered subjects, their practices, concepts and ideals and to the influence of their masculine identity on historical processes. This course will examine various issues concerning men and masculinities in the history of the modern Middle East, among others issues of Hegemonic Masculinity and power relations, the link between masculinity and colonialism, class formation and modernization, issues of sport, youth movements, sexuality and family. The lens of masculinity studies allows us to look from a different angle on questions that were traditionally answered from other standpoints and answer them in a different way, and indeed to pose new questions.
